I have reached out to the CEO/Administrator at ANTHC, to attend a meeting or send a representative in the near future. This will provide an opportunity for us to increase our communication and ability to report concerns.

Housing and Public Safety continue to be an issue. I have been connecting with the Homeless Coalition specifically awaiting more information about the re-entry programs, and how we might be able to assist with folks who did their re-entry prior to this coalition.

Emerging Leader

We have had some interest from our community about applying for the Emerging Leader position with CCTHITA. I have explored getting travel covered for this person by Central Council, and this support is not currently available. Application is still being developed and not posted on the Central Council website.

Ad Hoc Committee

I would like to have volunteers for a committee that would coordinate communication of member events of significance: Birthdays, Graduations, New Business Owner, and Appointments. These are things that are whole community should be proud of. We need a point of contact, and ways that we can get that information out.

Christmas tree and Decorations-Tlingit and Haida. There were some challenges in picking this up from the Guest House, and then the decorations were stored separately and picked up the day of the event. They were set out for pick up and when the committee went to get it, it was in the dumpster.

Committees:

<u>Set Up</u> The Church was unlocked prior to the start of the event, but access to our room was not open until 2:30. We got in there, and we had several volunteers immediately start setting up tables, chairs, and making coffee. Some people may have assisted that are not mentioned but those that signed up were: Ron Mallot and Family, Rosita Johnstun and Family, and the Social Committee. We also had a volunteer Nathan Starbard who was very helpful from set up to clean up.

<u>Food</u> Lynette did a great job of making sure that we had the officers confirm bringing a turkey or a ham. We used the donated funds to pick up Mashed Potatoes and Gravy, Bread, Vegetables, Stuffing, and Macaroni Salad, as well as candy items for door prizes, and to be put on the tables.

<u>Gift Wrapping</u> Mary hosted a wrapping party at her home. Present were: Lynette Hinz, Mary Moreno-Soots, Elizabeth Vanderway and Tasha Hotch. Mary also coordinated getting the more than 75 wrapped presents to the Party. After the party there were some gifts left over, and they were donated to the Alaska Native Medical Center.

<u>Donations</u> A letter was put together by the President, after receiving the EIN number on November 19, 2016 that had a list of items we were looking to have donated, and each letter had an authorized person to submit a request listed on it. We had several members help with this process: Alvin Edenshaw provided our EIN, Lynette Hinz went out and got donations, Donna Folger went out and got donations, Mary Moreno-Soots went out and got donations, Julianna Smith let us utilize her employee discount at Walmart, and the President went out and got donations. Lynette also arranged for us to get some air time on Channel 2 news to announce our event on giving Tuesday (December 1, 2015). We had several confirmations of donations come through after that.

<u>Communication</u> Tasha to make flyer-all to distribute and share. This was posted on our website, Facebook page, emailed, and handed out. We also had a flyer that recognized all of our wonderful partners that donated to our event. We also created little programs that were put at each table so everyone had an idea of the flow of the event.

<u>Setup/Clean Up</u> Everyone in attendance did a great job of helping put up the tables and chairs, and some wonderful volunteers and the social committee stayed behind to wash the dishes we used and to put them away. We ended up making some last minute purchases of garbage bags, paper towels and cleaning wipes, as we had gone through those that were already at the church.

<u>Holding Location Tlingit and Haida Items</u>: The Christmas Tree and Decorations are with Lynette Hinz. We discarded our large juice container as it had mold in it, and it has not been replaced. White serving spoons are with Tasha Hotch.

Other Items Purchased: We did have some left over plates and plastic ware that have been being used at our monthly meetings. However, the cost of them was not covered by our funds, and is an additional donation, as we have no fees associated with our monthly membership meetings to cover these items.

<u>Raffle</u>: We completed our first raffle during the Christmas Party. It was really exciting because everyone who won was a member of Tlingit and Haida, and the "big winner" was at the party. There was no initial discussion about the selling of the tickets during the party, so it wasn't as smooth as it could have been. More details will come from the Gaming Committee.

CITC - Johnson O'Malley (JOM) Native Student Activities Grant Program: Guidelines

1.0 Purpose

The CITC-JOM Native Student Activities Grant Program provides funding assistance to meet specialized and unique educational needs and enrich the educational experiences of Alaska Native and American Indian students enrolled full-time in grades Kindergarten - twelve (12) in the Anchorage School District (ASD).

2.0 About the Grants

- 2.1 **Source.** Funds for this Program are made available by the CITC-JOM Native Education Committee from the JOM federal grant. The total Grant Program amount for the year is approved by the Committee annually, subject to available funding.
- 2.2 **Grant Amounts**. The amount available per student is not to exceed \$500.00 during a calendar year. Technology cap of \$300 and cap of \$150 on clothing requests per request/sport.

3.0 **Eligibility**

- 3.1 Eligible students who may apply for a Grant must be
 - Alaska Native and/or American Indian children or youth and
 - Enrolled fulltime in ASD Kindergarten through grade twelve (12) (includes charter school/s).
- 3.2 Alaska Native / American Indian students, whose parents serve on the CITC-JOM Native Education Committee, may apply for a CITC-JOM grant, subject to the CITC-JOM Student Activities Grant eligibility requirements.

4.0 **Selection Priority and Deadline**

Selection shall be made in the order in which the application is received and based on application completeness. Priority will be given to eligible students who have not previously received a CITC – JOM Native Students Activities Program Grant. There is no deadline.

5.0 Use of Funds

CITC – JOM Native Student Activities Grant funds may be used for any of the following ASD –approved activities, provided other ASD funding sources or waiver is not already available:

- 5.1 Classroom supplies, books, ASD-approved on-line courses necessary for graduation, materials, uniforms, and/or equipment;
- 5.2 Extracurricular activities such as sports (includes NYO Games), music, drama, debate, forensics, art, related supplies, field trips, subsidy for drivers lessons and/or tests;
- 5.3 School sponsored club memberships / dues and activity fees;
- 5.4 Student bus passes between home and school for the ASD regular school year classes, after-school programs, and summer school for elementary students in need.

6.0 Application and Procedure -- Students:

- 6.1 Complete the CITC-JOM Activities Grant Program Application, sign, and date it. The application must also be signed/dated by the student's (a) parent or guardian and (b) either the student's current academic counselor or teacher.
- 6.2 Attach a copy of Proof of Indian blood (may be a Certificate of Indian Blood -CIB).

7.0 Application Review and Final Decision – CITC – JOM Program Staff:

- 7.1 The application will be reviewed and final decision made by JOM Coordinator and YEES Director (who are not immediate family members of the applicant).
- 7.2 Grant checks will be made payable and disbursed by CITC to the appropriate vendor, including the student's name, address and phone number for whom the grant is intended.

Entitled: In support of Sobermiut, Reviving Our Spirit (Sobermiut), an Alaska Native 501(c)3 non-profit

organization that is championing the creation of an Alaska Native Community Center for Alaska Native

residents in Anchorage, AK.

WHEREAS: Sobermiut's Vision Statement is "A society of individuals, families and communities of Arctic Nations who

are spiritually and culturally connected, and are leading a holistic approach to a healthy lifestyle."; and

WHEREAS: Sobermiut's Mission Statement is "To unify Alaska Native individuals, families, and communities to

revive shared values that help to recognize, reinforce and appreciate the merits of a healthy lifestyle

free of alcohol and drug abuse."; and

WHEREAS: The word sobermiut is a term derived from the Inupiat language meaning sober people; and

WHEREAS: In 2010, Sobermiut conducted an Alaska Native Community Needs Assessment within Anchorage,

Alaska, the executive summary of which stated that "A concern exists regarding the Alaska Native sense of belonging in our community and a need for a safe, clean, and healthy safe place for teens and the whole family that is drug and alcohol free; a center to have celebrations and include cultural

practices such as arts and crafts, to promote community unity."; and

WHEREAS: The Sobermiut recognizes the virtue of upholding the shared values of all indigenous peoples, e.g.,

"Unity", "Cooperation", "Respect for Self & Others", and the "Sharing of Resources for Mutual Survival", and did and will continue to approach many Alaska Native For-Profit and Non-Profit organizations with the idea of creating an Alaska Native Community Center in Anchorage, Alaska, for

all Alaska Native people; and

WHEREAS: Sobermiut has a business plan and received 10 architectural drawings from architectural students

enrolled in the University of Alaska Anchorage, Architectural and Engineering Technology Department, and formed partnerships with the Native Village of Eklutna, Tegbughna Foundation, Alaska Native Sports Association, Awakening Spiritual Unity, and the Path of the Raven, and in an on-going effort to build more partnerships Sobermiut seeks resolutions of support statewide from all federally recognized tribes, businesses, associations, consortiums, organizations, and all groups who share Sobermiut's vision for an

Alaska Native Community Center in Anchorage, Alaska.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Anchorage Tribes Tlingit and Haida Indians of Alaska do hereby support

the shared vision of Sobermiut, Reviving Our Spirit, and its desire to create an Alaska Native

Community Center in Anchorage, Alaska; and
